The Board of County Commissioners met in a regular session on Wednesday, June 4, 2025. Commissioner Smith, Commissioner Culbertson; Commissioner Reid, Commissioner Stieben and Commissioner Dove are present; Also present: Mark Loughry, County Administrator; Misty Brown, County Counselor; John Jacobson, Planning and Zoning Director; Amy Allison, Planning and Zoning Deputy Director; Bob Weber, County Appraiser; Roger Marrs, IT

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Paul Cromer commented.

ADMINISTRATIVE BUSINESS:

Commissioner Reid inquired if anyone will be attending the Economic Outlook Conference.

Commissioner Stieben indicated he would like to amend the policy for archiving of records to add the County Attorney's Office and the Sheriff's Department to a future agenda.

Commissioner Stieben asked questions regarding KORA and FOIA policies.

A motion was made by Commissioner Culbertson and seconded by Commissioner Smith to accept the consent agenda for Wednesday, June 4, 2025 as presented.

Motion passed, 5-0.

Mark Loughry presented a request from the city of Tonganoxie for a cost share project on 222nd St.

A motion was made by Commissioner Reid and seconded by Commissioner Stieben to authorize the County to participate with the city of Tonganoxie in the cost share of an overlay project on 222nd St. between Kansas Avenue and County Route #1 utilizing funds from the Hill's PILOT check in the amount of \$41,000.00.

Motion passed, 5-0.

Commissioner Smith read a letter expressing appreciation and thanks to the Tonganoxie City Manager.

Bob Weber presented Resolution 2025-20, reappointing him as the County Appraiser.

A motion was made by Commissioner Stieben and seconded by Commissioner Culbertson to approve Resolution 2025-20, appointing Robert Weber as County Appraiser for a term beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2029.

Roger Marrs presented Board Order 2025-6, initiating the tax sale.

A motion was made by Commissioner Stieben and seconded by Commissioner Smith to approve Board Order 2025-6, directing tax counsel to initiate judicial tax lien foreclosure proceedings.

Motion passed, 5-0.

Amy Allison presented Resolution 2025-18, a rezoning request from RR-2.5 to RR-1.

A motion was made by Commissioner Culbertson and seconded by Commissioner Reid to adopt Resolution 2025-18 and approve the rezoning as outlined in Case DEV-25-022 based on the findings of the Golden Factors, as set forth in the staff report and as substantiated by the findings of fact as adopted by the Planning Commission. Motion passed, 4-1, Commissioner Dove voting nay.

Ms. Allison presented Resolution 2025-19, a rezoning request from RR-5 to RR-2.5.

A motion was made by Commissioner Stieben and seconded by Commissioner Smith to adopt Resolution 2025-19 and approve the rezoning as outlined in Case DEV-25-038 based on the findings of the Golden Factors, as set forth in the staff report and as substantiated by the findings of fact as adopted by the Planning Commission.

Motion passed, 5-0.

Commissioner Reid requested the representative from the local homeless shelter to speak at a meeting.

Commissioner Stieben attended the state of the school district in Basehor.

Commissioner Stieben spoke about animal control and the Leavenworth Humane Society funding.

A motion was made by Commissioner Stieben and seconded by Commissioner Smith to adjourn. Motion passed, 5-0.

My education is in Engineering and Computer Science which affords me no unique or beneficial qualities either, and as I have seen sometimes can be considered a drawback or a shortcoming.

My work experience has been with several Fortune 500 organizations and numerous significant KC-area businesses as an IT consultant and employee. This has given me some perspective of the importance of confronting the digital divide and the advantages that providing such capabilities afford.

My wife and I are the proud owners of The Quilting Emporium at 514-B Shawnee Street. I own Castiam, LLC which provides IT consulting to the greater Kansas City area. We recognize the need for a strong business environment. Growing up in Leavenworth during the 60's, 70's and early 80's I participated in my Father's medical practice and enjoyed the small town feel that he strived to promote during his day. I yearn for that vibrancy again.

Finally, I am simply an observer of the actions and results of these actions in Leavenworth and Johnson counties for the most of my life and a great desire to see great things happen in my home town and county.

None that I am aware of at this time. And other than a few meetings that I was unable to attend (out-of-town travel; a former county employee celebration) I have been reliable in my attendance and notification of such.

What do you see as the objectives and goals of the commission? What do you feel are some of the key issues facing Leavenworth County in the next five to 10 years?

Leavenworth County is on the cusp of growth that is similar to the growth southwest Johnson County embraced in the late 90's and sustains to this day. This commission should look to foster this growth while maintaining much of its small-town, historic and agricultural feel.

With the relocation of the American Royal next door to us we need to ensure that we are not a detraction from their stated goals, purposes, and benefit they provide to the area. I too worry about any negative repercussions that could result from violations of local, state and federal statutes and the difficulties with enforcement. At the moment it feels as though the Planning Commission is at the tip of the spear. If so, we have our work cut out for us.

How would you help to achieve these objectives and goals?

Continue to focus on the following key areas: Transportation (the new Centennial Bridge project; improved accessibility to I-435/MO-152 and the Kansas City MO Northland areas; development of the I-70/K-32 Corridor; accessibility to the DeSoto Panasonic facility) to facilitate business growth and improved access to the modernized MCI airport; Encouraging business starts/relocations to expand job opportunities and improve access to revenues needed to maintain the county's charm while advancing it into a stronger future ; and significantly improved telecommunications and internet access county-wide to ensure rural, suburban and urban businesses have access to vastly superior capabilities (as evidenced by Google Fibers impact to the greater KC area) while also providing for the technically connected self-employed and work-from-home individuals that has been seen a surge in recent years; addressing

residential housing needs for the growth that will result, similar to that seen in Olathe and Gardner.

I would enjoy the opportunity to assist in the exploration of such hi-speed data infrastructure. I would also enjoy the opportunity to assist in courting a data center company, such as Microsoft because of their relationship with the DOD and Fort Leavenworth. Google and Amazon have already development of data centers in the Kansas City area.

Its charter is stated as: the Planning Commission conducts hearings related to amendments to the county's zoning ordinance, including rezoning property and a comprehensive plan, and makes recommendations. It also makes recommendations regarding development cases such as plats. The body also convenes as the Board of Zoning Appeals to hear requests for variances from county zoning and subdivision regulations. What is not stated is the guiding theme, the "what's between the lines", for what make Leavenworth County desirable to live in and what we as a community, including its elected and appointed representative, do to ensure its retains that desirability.

How do you think you would balance residents' concerns with overall County goals and long-term benefits?

The challenge still exists in seeing the county receive LATVR funds from the state. Previously the "Revenue Neutral" budget and mil levy hearings the County Commission tried to address the economic challenges that all residents are encountering weighed against the same impacts and challenges the county is also encountering. I am aware of departures from the county, or attempts to better structure property holdings for family and tax planning purposes. I know that I and other residents feel the pain, but would like to mitigate large scale pain in the future. Unfortunately we all must endure together and shoulder the burden to ensure continuity of services and retention of staff is maintained, hence staving off a larger even more undesirable future pain.

It has been remarked in a recent Leavenworth Times article that a shortage of builders make it difficult for new home starts. I know from spending 1-1/2 years living at the RV park in Easton that the majority of renters there are working at the Panasonic Plant if not on USP projects. What isn't known is the number of local trades people that are doing the same. NOTE: This has affected my ability to find a local builder for my property, and I have no takers from builders from outside of the county.

More in my line of thinking is attempting to attract high-value corporations involved with AI that would build out facilities HERE! Combined with high-speed data you have the foundation for attracting start-ups in AI.

Being able to provide newer homes and local jobs would help to improve the revenue base. Let's not let that leak out to the surrounding counties.

Recommendation: Review Documents provide Staff direction.

Analysis: Based upon previous discussions that focused on the financial feasibility of replacing bridges on low volume roads, I have made as many cost savings adjustments as possible to the bridge replacement program to reduce cost. Historically, the construction of a KDOT Low Cost Steel Beam Bridge was the most economical option for low volume roadways when the bridge length was not longer than 40'. I have met with various mid-west steel and bridge suppliers/contractors. Concrete structures that last longer require more labor which has increased substantially in cost and more concrete which has also increased substantially in cost. It is now more economical in the short term to replace structures under 75' utilizing the downloadable KDOT bridge plans. This process involves potential risks but those risks are not greater than the savings and allow a county to eliminate the design process saving additional funds in addition to construction cost savings. More or less, the projects are bid utilizing the concept that we want this bridge built in a specific location without any engineering work being completed specific to the construction location. By changing every bridge in the CIP that would be eligible for this process, I estimated the overall savings of \$2.5 million.

Using that savings, I placed \$500,000 per year to be set aside for Dust Abatement projects to be completed by county crews for the next five years. This is the maximum allocation of road staff resources, and may in some years exceed staffing time, that could be completed without contracting the work out. The time spent on these projects will reduce the amount of time that road staff will be performing the general asphalt patching and chip and seal prep work that has occurred the past five years. I have prepared a map that is a pollical district distribution of roadways that is staff's recommendation of which 2.5 miles of roadway should be paved in each district first. These roads were selected using input that commissioners have provided, traffic counts, maintenance issues created by leaving the road gravel, and avoid overly steep hills that should be cut down prior to hard surfacing.

I have also included a map of the bridges previously discussed as being on low volume roadways to facilitate discussion.

Also included is the map provided by Commissioner Culbertson at the May 21st meeting.

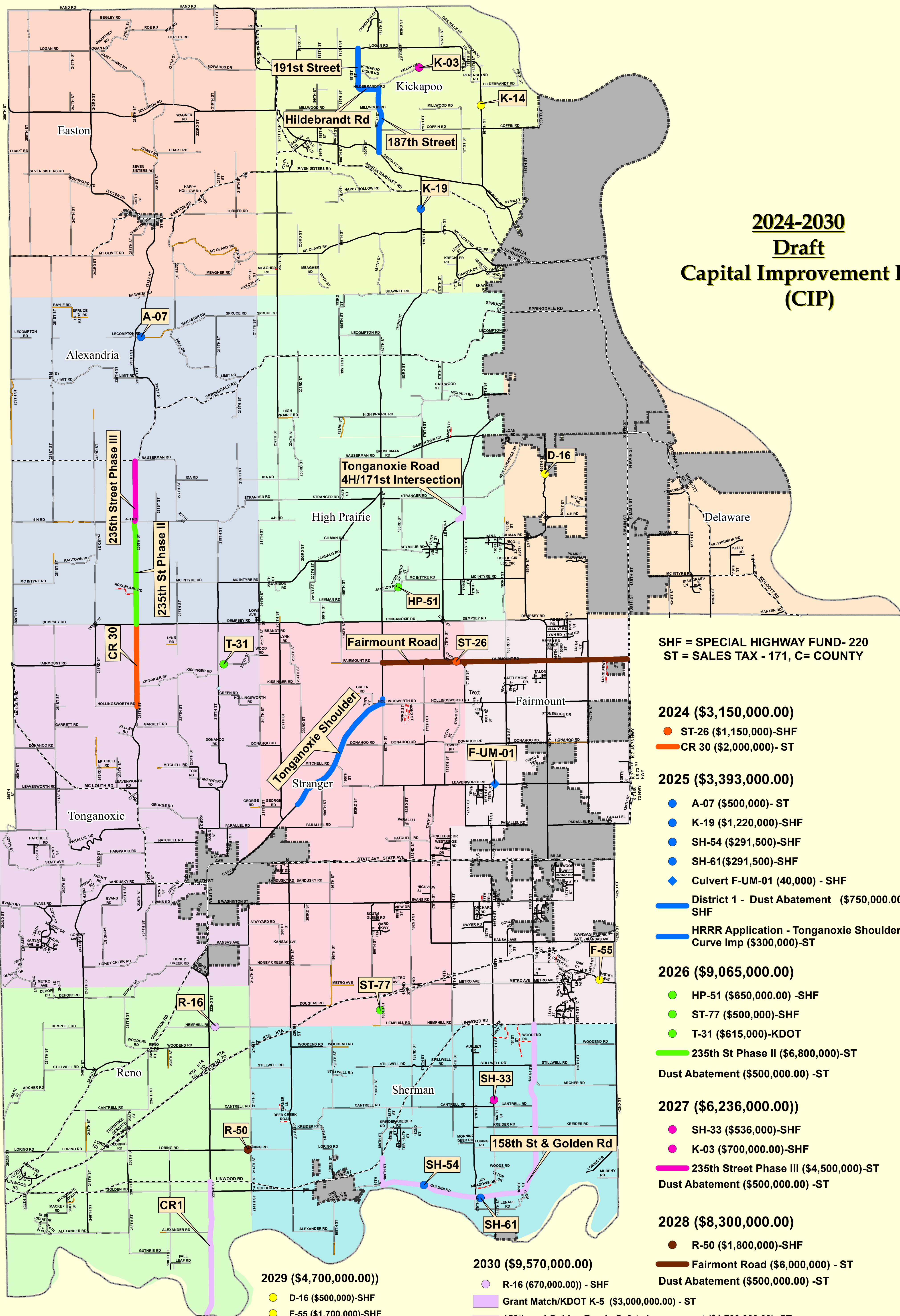

	There are 43 bridges with a posted load rating of 15 tons or less. The immediate result of this will be that school buses will not be able to cross these structures if they get lower ratings in the 2026 inspection cycle. The low term result will be that we will be required to close bridges by our inspection firm and KDOT. In order to stay front of detours and closures as best possible we need to replace all of these bridges before the sales tax measure ends in 2036. We were notified by Finney and Turnipseed in 2024 to prepare for the 2026 Biannual Bridge Inspections. They have notified us they were gently bringing the county into proper bridge ratings from years of Benesch reviews that did not decrease the sufficiency ratings. They stated we should expect the 2026 review cycle to mirror the 2026 inspections where 45% of bridges see condition downgrades.													
	As you are aware, \$125,000 budgeted for bridge design is an aggressive estimate that only a few firms may offer.
